Why should more people "choose to challenge" gender inequality?



Since 1911, International Women's Day has celebrated the achievements of women. This year, on March 8th, the theme was "choose to challenge" - and organisers encouraged people to choose to speak out and challenge gender inequality. But why are women still having to fight for equality in 2021?

Inequality between men and women is measured in four key areas: money, health, education and political power. According to the World Economic Forum (WEF), progress has been made but men still have better opportunities than women.


Experts think it could take nearly 100 years to achieve a gender-equal world. This means that many women who are alive today may never get to experience gender equality.

Saadia Zahidi, managing director at the WEF, thinks that in order to "hurry history", governments need to give women more political power so that it becomes normal for people to see them as leaders.

So far, no country has achieved gender equality and António Guterres, the UN secretary-general, believes that covid-19 has made the situation worse. Research shows that many women have been unable to escape from unsafe homes and more women than men have taken on unpaid work caring for others.

So, with fresh challenges brought on by the pandemic, is it more important than ever for people to "choose to challenge" gender inequality?






How easy is it to challenge inequality? Mark your opinion on the scale below with an X. What about António Guterres? Where would he put his X? What about a girl with fewer role models?


PERSPECTIVE FLIP

PARLIAMENT =

a group of politicians, usually chosen in elections, who help to make the laws in a country

Research shows that countries with more women in positions of political power usually have more women in business leadership.

Research from the World Economic Forum shows that generally, when countries improve their gender equality, they become more productive and therefore richer.

Dr Nina Ansary, an expert on global gender inequality, believes that role models matter, particularly for women. She says:
